CHRISTMAS - WITHOUT RUDOLF?

Some Christmases ago, our exhausted family were delighted to stumble across a pair of Reindeer in Buckinghamshire. Well, they weren't wandering the Chilterns, but were being proudly shown-off to children and parents at the World's End market garden outside Wendover. Our two girls were awe-struck at these almost mythical creatures. They were wowed by how they were so well-equipped for Arctic conditions. Spreading hooves to deal with the deep snow. Hollow fur for insulation in the freezing winds.

A delightful picture. Something to warm our hearts this Christmas. But there is sadly, bad news for our 'Winter Wonderland' Christmas. The awful fact is, baby reindeer are dying in huge numbers. Lying down, curling up and dying. Now and over the last few years. The snows are less predictable. Much worse is the fact that the snow is thawing early and refreezing, so the reindeer cannot eat the grass they usually find under the snow. The Reindeer herds are facing the real and imminent prospect of extinction.

I find myself being a modern-day Jeremiah. Or, if you like, a Christian Grinch. Let us not forget that the Grinch had a point about the Hoobs. And it took a child, risking her life, to encourage her family to listen to the Grinch.

People will understandably object to this 'doom and gloom' message. We are good news people. And Christmas is a time for good news. Yes, Christmas is good news - for all creation: 'Ox and ass before him bow, for He is in a manger now'. Yes, Christmas is good news for all the world, including the Arctic. But this is right now warming up much faster than other regions of our world.

Fact is, we follow a zero-carbon Saviour. Someone not born into the equivalent of a western, luxury lifestyle. Someone who walked the footpaths of the Promised Land and wondered at its many natural marvels. Someone who, as a carpenter, would have understood. Understood chopping down all the trees of Galilee to make tables and chairs was not good news for business, creation or for the people of Galilee. Someone who would likely be appalled at our extravagant and wasteful 'Christmas'.

I find myself in mourning this Christmas. How else can I respond after COP27? The nations of the world have preferred not to face reality. Not to face the mega-death juggernaut bearing down on us all. Ahead of us is the real prospect of a global self-exile much more painful than the Babylonian exile. But who will listen to these songs of anguish and lament this Christmas?

Following Jesus means living more simply so that others may simply live. So, I encourage you to find ways to reduce waste this Christmas. To not spend on goods that have been flown across the globe. To reduce the amount of meat you eat (if you can afford to buy Turkey!). To make sure the Christmas cards you send (and the crackers you crack) are produced from re-cycled card or sustainable sources. I know. This is going to complicate the Christmas shop even more! And make it, for some Christmas items, probably more expensive – just less costly for God's creation. People will say that at a time of greater stress, they don't need even more to think about this Christmas. But then, William Carey and his generation often described coming to faith as 'becoming thoughtful'.

'The people walking in darkness have seen a great light...' (Isaiah 9:3).

Tribute to Martin Legg (21 June 1935 – 24 October 2022)

It's impossible to think or talk about Martin without mentioning how central his Christian faith was to his life. His faith enhanced and enriched his life. He treated faith as a gift and he made his faith a gift to others.

One example of this was at the Church Meeting a few months ago when he bravely told us that he had a cancer diagnosis and was to undergo major surgery. He said, "I am content, I am in the Lord's hands. I trust Him for all that is to come."

Martin lived the truth of the words of St Paul that he chose to be read at his Celebration and Commemoration service: "I am convinced that [nothing] will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus, our Lord." (Romans 8: 37,39). In doing so, especially in recent weeks, Martin was an inspiration to many.

A successful career in the motor industry and his remarkable ability to take apart and reassemble cars reveal his love for motor vehicles. "If it's not broken, take it apart and fix it anyway" appears to have been his approach.

A man of life-long faith, Martin became fully involved with Belmont Road church after the death of his wife, Doreen in 1995. He is remembered for his faithful grace and wisdom, his practical care of the building, deep friendships with other Belmont stalwarts and for his service to others. This service was nowhere better expressed than at the weekly lunch club and annual lunch club week away, where it was known that for him, "nothing was too much trouble" in making sure everyone had the best time possible.

Along with others, Martin gained notoriety for his holiday Last Night Concert renditions of Joyce Grenfell's poem, *Stately as a Galleon*. This required the use of skirts, blouses and balloons. I'll leave the rest to your imagination.

Martin was a loving, family man. With his children, Jackie and Steve, and their families, we mourn Martin's passing, celebrate his life and seek to follow his example. We give thanks to God that nothing separates Martin from the love of God, that is in Christ Jesus, our Lord. *Tim Keightley*

Embrace the Middle East


Twice-weekly reflections straight to your inbox



THANK YOU FOR BRINGING HOPE



You've helped Richard feed his family.

Fuel and food prices were on the rise, sometimes more than doubling. Wisdom from leaders was that the only way to handle Uganda's cost of living crisis was to live more frugally. But people like Richard, a farmer living in Gulu, were already struggling to feed their families, sometimes surviving on just one meal a day. With exploitative middlemen ready to make a tidy profit from farmers who couldn't afford to transport their crops to market, it felt to BMS World Mission worker Benon Kayanja as though bridging the gap to meet essential needs was impossible.

Wonderfully, BMS supporters read Richard's story and responded with incredible generosity – despite many families in the UK facing their own worries about escalating living costs this autumn. You raised over £102,000 to support projects

that are helping families to weather this crisis, as well as shoring up similar work across the world

"Thanks to the incredible amount raised through this appeal, we are able to increase the number of farmers we can provide seedlings to," explains Benon. "This will have an amazing knock-on effect, meaning a greater number of farmers can provide vital food and help generate income for their families."

But in a crisis with a truly global impact, your gifts have stretched beyond Uganda to support vulnerable families in places like Lebanon and Nepal, too. In Nepal, farmers have been given access to veterinary training and breeding goats that will boost their income. And in Lebanon, Syrian refugee families have been given crucial education opportunities for their children – and are feeling hopeful for the first time in years.

It's clear the cost of living crisis isn't over yet. And yet your generous response means that vulnerable people across the world will still be reached with lifechanging help.

A FAIR COP?

So we have come to the end of another COP. Thousands of experts coming together to tackle the climate crisis – for the 27th time. So why is progress to prevent the thawing of glaciers, so glacially slow?

Listening to my colleagues in Christian Aid who were there, it's not that surprising.

Apparently COP27 felt like a huge fossil fuel trade fair, with flashy pavilions hosted by Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates (two of the biggest oil producing nations) with the UAE having had over 1000 staff there. 636 fossil fuel lobbyists were also granted passes this year, a 25% increase on COP26. Not surprisingly, the final text of the agreement now includes a reference to "low emission and renewable energy". This is looks like a significant loophole that could allow the development of further gas resources, which produces less emissions than coal and CEOs of gas companies were apparently calling themselves 'climate champions'!

President Sheikh Mohammed bin Zayed al-Nahyan of the UAE, said his country would continue to deliver oil and gas for as long as the world is in need. Interestingly, the next COP will take place in... the UAE. Many African countries were also keen to use the COP as a platform to actually promote new oil and gas initiatives in their countries. Apparently, Egypt did at least five gas deals at COP27.

As Babawale Obayanju, from Friends of the Earth Africa stated "We don't need more gas extraction in Africa, devastating our communities for the benefit of rich countries and corporations. What we needed from COP27 was agreement to a rapid, equitable phase out of **all** fossil fuels."

Despite this backdrop, there was a significant victory – the establishment of a Loss and Damage Fund, something which wasn't even certain to be on the agenda at the start of the conference. This reparations fund for countries most affected by climate change has been hailed as a "historic moment", the most important since the Paris Agreement at COP 2015.

There are many details to be resolved, however, such as how much will be contributed by who and which countries will receive the funds – for example there was an argument as to whether India and China should be regarded as developing nations so they could be recipients.

Another significant cause for optimism is that Lula, the President-Elect of Brazil, committed to protecting the earth's biodiversity and stopping all

deforestation of the Amazon which is a reversal of the position by the current Government.

Whilst the experts continue to discuss and delay, we can all do our small part to help, starting perhaps by looking at our carbon footprint using a calculator such as the one on the World Wildlife Fund website https://footprint.wwf.org.uk and deciding to take action by making changes to our lifestyles.

One thing seems certain – we cannot wait for COP to deliver its glacial response to this urgent crisis.
