WHAT IS YOUR 'GOLIATH'

How do you read the Bible to make a difference in your life?

Everyone will have different ways. Some like to focus on the original words and the context of the time they were first heard. Some like to learn memory verses. I like to imagine myself into the Bible story - almost as if I was being cast as one of the parts in a movie! I'm about to write a sermon on the story of David and Goliath, (1 Samuel 17) and I want to ask these questions:

What is your 'Goliath'? Is it a situation outside of you, or are 'you' your biggest challenge? Are you getting enough sleep to help you in your challenges? Are you low in self-control? Is your 'Goliath' your health, family or job? Depression can certainly be a 'Goliath'.

Who are you in the story? The soldiers didn't dare approach the giant - in their mind they were already defeated. King Saul wanted someone else to fight his battle, but still wanted to control the armour David wore - like a back seat driver. Goliath himself was arrogant and felt indestructible, but ignored the small thing which caused his downfall. David was passionate for God's cause and faced the giant head on with God's help. Whoever you are in the story, imagine if your character actually listened to God speaking to them.

What unsuited armour have you tried? If your 'Goliath', like mine, is comfort eating, then most diets are the wrong armour for you, like the armour Saul tried to make David wear. There needs to be a more suited approach to your real need for a long-lasting impact.

What are your 5 pebbles? What is God calling us to pick up and use in our fight against our 'Goliath'? For me, I think my 'pebbles' are:

- Prayer and journaling, to ask for God's help and to track what makes me feel a certain way. Some people are at risk when they are Hungry, Angry, Lonely or Tired (the initials spell HALT)
- Staying out of the temptation zone - whether that is a certain time, location, activity or friendship group. It may be as simple as going to bed earlier!
- Plan your safe route out of the temptation zone in advance. If you know something unavoidable will trigger your 'Goliath', plan in advance what to do straight after.
- Staying positive and giving thanks to God. If you celebrate the victories won with God's help, you will be more willing and able to stand up against your 'Goliath'
- Have someone to talk to honestly. Some organisations call this a Sponsor.

May our battles with our 'Goliaths' make us stronger, benefit others and bring us all closer to God

AGM Reports

A number of reports were circulated prior to the AGM of Churches Together on 22nd June. Two of these appear below. If you would like to read them all (including reports from the Chairman, the Secretary, CAP, Cornergate Foundation, Discovery, Expressions Academy, Dacorum Street Pastors, Youth Across Hemel) please contact your Church Secretary or the Editor. Taken together, they give a picture of how Christian organisations in the town responded to the pandemic and in some cases were able to continue their work during 2020.

Liberty Tea Rooms & Community Hub

This has been a very difficult year for local business. We have sadly seen the closure of many businesses in the town centre and due to current restrictions it has not been possible for us to open our doors.

None of us could have anticipated how long this forced closure would have gone on for. However, during this time it has given us an opportunity to pause and reflect on how we do things going forward. It has also been a great opportunity for us to introduce a new website www.libertytearooms.co.uk and to carry out some refurbishments. All will be revealed when we relaunch the charity later this summer.

As we have been closed for well over a year we will need to retrain the volunteer team before we can open. Sadly we have lost over 50%

of our volunteer team for various reasons. Therefore, we are launching a recruiting campaign for new volunteers. If you are interested in joining the team do get in touch by email **hello@libertytearooms.co.uk**

We are so grateful to all who have continued to financially support us through this very difficult year. This includes churches, individuals, businesses, together with government grants and the furlough scheme. Any donations received ensure that we will remain an active Christian presence in the town centre.

Earlier this year Owen stepped down as CAP Centre Manager, after fifteen years of serving the town. Liberty Tea Rooms and Community Hub are happy to report that we have secured a new CAP Centre Manager, Christina Bird, from Christchurch Hemel. She has settled into her new role very well and is doing a great job, despite lockdown restrictions.

Owen is now our Community Development Manager, which enables us to develop community relations both inside the charity and with businesses, churches and local agencies. It is really important that people fully understand our Mission, Vision, Ethos and Values of who we are and why we exist.

Looking ahead, it is our intention to visit all of the churches who have been faithfully supporting us from the start, to share some very exciting plans and initiatives. Dacorum becomes first Silver Level Carbon Literate borough council


"We are proud to announce that we have become the first borough council in the UK to achieve a Silver level Carbon Literate Organisation accreditation.

OLYMPIC GOLD

This month should see the start of the Tokyo Olympics, having been postponed from last year due to the Coronavirus pandemic. A number of New Testament letters refer to Olympic sport including Hebrews: 'Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles, and let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us. Let us fix our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith' (Hebrews 12:1-2).

The Christian life is compared to a long-distance race, but despite the struggles and obstacles, there is a great crowd of witnesses cheering us on. We have a heavenly Father who loves us and a Saviour who has run the race before us. If we keep our eyes fixed on Jesus, He will enable us to finish the race.

During the 1992 Barcelona Olympics, the British athlete Derek Redmond was running in the semi-finals of the 400 metres. About 250 metres from the finish his hamstring tore. He fell to the ground in pain and stretcher bearers came over to him. However, Redmond was determined to finish the race and so he started hopping toward the finishing line. Suddenly Jim Redmond, Derek's father, ran out of the stands towards him. "You don't have to do this," he told his son. "Yes, I do," said Derek, to which his father said, "We're going to finish this together." They completed the lap with Derek leaning on his father's shoulder. As they crossed the finish line, the spectators rose to give Derek a standing ovation. Although he didn't win an Olympic medal, Derek Redmond finished the race with his father at his side. Let's not forget the encouragement we have to finish the race!

THIS MONTH 100 YEARS AGO

We continue our series about church life at Marlowes Baptist Church in the 1920's. The minister began his letter in the August issue of Marlowes Notes by writing about the benefits of holidays:

‘MY DEAR FRIENDS,

With the advent of the month of August one's thoughts naturally turn towards holidays, and everyone who can possibly manage it, tries to take a brief period of rest and change. Many make for some of our charming seaside resorts, others seek out some delightful spot in the quiet and beauty of the country. "A period of rest" says one well-known writer "is not a luxury, it is a necessity. It's part of the constitution of our nature which can never be disregarded with impunity." Some have already been and returned, a good many are away at the present time, and others are looking forward to their opportunity. It is my earnest hope that all will derive great benefit, both physically and spiritually. There is no doubt that a little break from the ordinary tasks, means a renewal of interest when we return, we get back to our work with a new enthusiasm....

Later in his letter Mr George referred to the fact that he would be concluding his ministry at Marlowes at the end of September. He had received a call to a church in Birmingham. Further on in the 'Notes' we learn that this was announced on 24th July and that a subsequent Church Meeting passed a resolution expressing appreciation for his ministry over the past seven years.
