DOING CHRISTMAS THE RIGHT WAY

I wonder if you 'do' Christmas Day the 'Right Way'? The way the Keightleys do Christmas Day, and have done for years, is: church, dinner, presents. This has become the 'Right Way' to do Christmas Day. Anything else, for example: presents, church, dinner, is the Wrong Way. Everyone knows that. (Don't even get me started on presents, dinner and no church!)

From what I hear, many of us repeat the same patterns each year over Christmas: the order in which we do things, the people we see, even down to always having turkey (and ham, please) sandwiches on Christmas night. (Have you made them yet, Dad?) There are events we try not to miss; Carols by Candlelight perhaps or a pantomime trip. "On Boxing Day we always..."

To some, this repetitiveness may sound very dull and unimaginative. Surely, this way we end up just going through the motions. We hear the same bible passages each year and more or less the same sermons. Surely this way lies boredom? For others, however, it's the very fact that we are repeating something we love to do, hear or see that appeals. And while there may be only so many ways to say, "God is with us, isn't that fabulous?" the truth of that has the power to surprise and refresh us every year.

According to the theory of 'Hedonistic adaptation' as pleasures grow familiar they stop delivering joy (citation link below) so we have to try something else. But apparently not necessarily so. Recent (2019) research found that, to quote my source article (see below*), "people enjoy repeat experiences more than they predict they will. And not because they use the sameness to lull themselves into a comfortable trance, but because they discover new things they'd missed first time around." Even a daily walk to the same corner shop is a unique experience if we only take the trouble to notice the differences each time.

So, the research suggests to me, it can be with Christmas. If we take the trouble to listen, look and see, we will encounter something new. Some insight or realisation a song or Carol will inspire; a new thought or image provoked by a reading or sermon; something helpful someone will say, a new perspective on long held truths. Try it. Let Christmas surprise you. Having said that, for some, Christmas can seem a repeated reminder of all they do not have – a home, a family, somewhere warm to stay, friends. One way we can help counter that, is to support those churches and organisations working to include the more marginalised among us, so they too can experience the joy and the surprise.

Each day is unique – there has never been this today before. This Christmas will be unique too if we pay attention.

Whichever Way you 'do' Christmas Day (though I hope you will do it the Right Way :) may you be blessed. God is with us; isn't that fabulous?

Tribute to Win Clarke

We are sad to record the death of Win Clarke on 14th November, at the age of 93. She was born in Islington, where she began work, at the age of 15, as a Clerical Assistant in the GPO and was later promoted to Clerical Officer. It was there that she met Ray and they were married in 1953. Two of their sons were born in Islington and two in Hemel Hempstead, after they moved here in 1958. Win and Ray took up ballroom dancing in the mid-1970's and won many awards. Holidays, both in this country and abroad, were a highlight of their lives for many years. Win was a life long knitter, who was always knitting something, including Postman Pat jumpers for the grandchildren. She continued to knit until her late 80s, when her arthritis made this too difficult.

Win and Ray started attending Carey Baptist Church in the early 1980's and were received into membership in July 1991. Win was a member of the Ladies' Group, did flower-arranging, was on the Coffee Rota for serving refreshments after the morning services and made wonderful cakes for bazaars etc and the Heather Club. She and Ray also helped with stewarding for many years. Comments from friends at Carey have included: 'She was so kind' and 'She was a lovely lady' and she will be remembered with great affection.

SAVE YOUR STAMPS



REFLECTIONS ON COP26 FROM BMS WORLD MISSION

Laura-Lee Lovering, BMS Creation Stewardship Co-ordinator writes:

Dear brothers and sisters,

The UN climate change conference (COP26) lasted two weeks and I'm sure you, like me, have been both encouraged and discouraged by the pacts, pledges and promises that have emerged, right up to and beyond the last minute on Saturday 13 November.

Pledges by more than 100 countries to reduce methane emissions (methane is about 80 times more potent than CO2 as a greenhouse gas (GHG), although it doesn't stay in the atmosphere for as long) and reverse deforestation by 2030 are certainly positive outcomes. However, the current verdict on the climate change mitigation measures presented by each participating nation, almost 200 countries, is that the 1.5°C global warming threshold is very likely to overshoot and exceed 2°C.

Here in Peru, which contributes less than one per cent of global GHG emissions, we have been warned about the impacts of climate change on our future water supply due to the rapidly melting Andean glaciers. Seasonal meltwater from these glaciers is a significant source of freshwater throughout the country but scientists forecast that at the current rate of warming they will have melted completely within two decades.

It's very easy to feel anxious or frustrated about the scale of the problem, yet in my last email I hoped to encourage you that there are actions that all of us can take to play our part as responsible stewards of God's good creation. I gave up meat for the duration of COP26 because I know that large-scale industrial livestock raising emits large amounts of GHGs and contributes to tropical deforestation. It wasn't as hard as I thought it might be and I've since found it easier to not return to eating meat every day. I wonder what actions you or your church have been able to take?

Whatever you have or haven't been able to do yet, I encourage you to not give up!

We at BMS World Mission are committed to reducing our ecological footprint, including our carbon emissions, and offsetting what we can't cut out totally. We're investing in projects overseas that reduce

dependency on fossil fuels with solar power in Chad and help sequester GHGs through tree planting in Uganda.

And when Genesis Acaye, a BMS mission worker in Uganda, provides agricultural training in his community, he also focuses on environmentally friendly farming, rubbish collection and disposal as well as using energy-saving stoves.

Of course, we wouldn't be able to do any of this without your support! So, if you are thinking about what action to take next, I would encourage you to consider becoming a 24:7 Partner, partnering in BMS' efforts all over the world through regular giving. Let's not become weary of doing the good that we can, but let us continue to stand together as the body of Christ and stewards of God's good creation.

Thank you for all your prayers during COP26. Thank you for responding in whatever way you can to protect God's creation and thank you for choosing to be a part of God's work.

SPURGEONS CHILDREN'S CHARITY

Spurgeons was founded in 1867 by one of the most well-known public figures of the day – a Baptist preacher called Charles Haddon Spurgeon. He founded an orphanage in Stockwell, south London. The Spurgeons Home moved first to Surrey and then to Kent after the war, but closed in the late 1970's. Since then, Spurgeons has supported vulnerable children and families through many different types of work across the UK. Today, the charity has contact with over 30,000 children and adults, whilst working more intensively with over 3,000 children and young people.

Over the last financial year during Covid-19 and lockdown, 783 children were identified in safeguarding incidents Spurgeons responded to. 86% of children whose outcomes were measured with an evidence-based measuring tool showed positive progress.

Spurgeons services include children centres and family hubs, prisonbased family support, services to support young carers, families affected by domestic abuse and to girls and young woman in, or at risk of, joining gangs. Parenting courses and support are also offered by Spurgeons, and more recently, school counselling and support through the services of Fegans, which transferred into Spurgeons on 1st July 2021.

THIS MONTH 100 YEARS AGO

We continue our series about church life at Marlowes Baptist Church in the 1920's. We do not have copies of the November or December 1921 or January 1922 Marlowes Notes, but in the February 1922 issue there were some items relating to events in December and January.

Winter Treat

On December 27th the Junior and Primary Departments assembled in the large schoolroom for the annual Christmas treat. The first, and perhaps the most effective item, for the evening was the tea. About 105 eager children sat down to a tea which was practically of pre-war standard, the anticipated result being that the tables were quickly relieved of their load.

By way of entertainment a Jazz Troupe, composed of Primary Helpers, rendered numerous well-known choruses to the children, and judging from the many encores called for one could only conclude that this form of amusement was fully appreciated by all. This Jazz Band proved to be an incentive to the scholars, and a considerable amount of hitherto unknown skill in music and elocution was found to exist among them. The dismantling of the Christmas Tree came as the finishing touch, and, as always, was a fascinating event to all. Every child had at present, and special prizes were given to those who had good attendance records for

the year. In this way the time passed very quickly, and the parents soon came to take home their sleepy-eyed little ones...

Social

The Thanksgiving Social on January 11th was a success in spite of inclement weather, some 80 or 90 friends assembled and spent a very pleasant evening. A very enjoyable programme of music was provided by our organist and choir, with solos by Miss. Webb, Mr Webb, and cornet solos by Mr. A.H. East. The generous start of £25 from the Women's League and liberal response of all to the appeal made from the Chair by our honoured leader Mr. A.J. Channels enables us to announce a total of £80 raised towards the £150 needed. Refreshments were served by our ever-ready and efficient Ladies' Committee, and words of cheer were spoken by the Deacons who appreciate fully the hearty co-operation of all in maintaining the traditions of dear old Marlowes. (There is no indication what this appeal was for.)

Annual General Meeting

The AGM was held on January 18th, but attendance 'was affected by the inclement weather and prevailing sickness', with only 50 members present compared with 90 the previous year!) 'the Secretary's statement showed present membership 252" and the Financial Report presented revealed a total raised for all purposes of £1,189:3:1¾. The Fund for New School Building (Memorial Hall) was stated to be £570.'

WEEK OF PRAYER FOR CHRISTIAN UNITY 18TH – 25TH JANUARY

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity is traditionally observed from the 18th to the 25th January – the octave of St. Peter and St. Paul. However, some areas observe it at Pentecost or some other time.

The story of the Magi visiting the Holy Family in Bethlehem is one very familiar to us. The Magi have sometimes been seen as a symbol of the world's diversity – different religions and cultures – that comes to pay homage to the Christ-child. The story might therefore represent the unity of all created that God desires.

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity in 2022 has been prepared by the churches of the Middle East, the history of which was, and still is, characterised by conflict and strife, tainted with blood and darkened by injustice and oppression. The Christians of the Middle East offer these resources conscious that the world shares many of the travails and much of the difficulties that it experiences, and yearns for a light to lead the way to the Saviour who is the light that overcomes darkness.

Serving the Gospel today requires a commitment to the human being, especially the poorest, the weakest and those marginalised. It requires from the churches transparency and accountability in dealing with the world, and with each other. This means churches need to cooperate to provide relief to the afflicted, to welcome the displaced, to relieve the burdened, and to build a just and honest society. This is a call for churches to work together so that young people can build a good future according to God's heart, a future in which all human beings can experience life, peace, justice, and love.
