LIVING THE GOOD NEWS – A STORY

'Hi, my name is Giovanni, or if you like, Francesco. I was born into a wealthy family and as a young man I loved wearing the best, designer clothes. I liked splashing the cash and laid on lavish parties for all my friends. I went into my father's business, selling fine silk and other fancy stuff. The family boutique was well-known in our city, visited by A-list celebrities and rich wannabees. We also had an up-market stall which I ran. What a life I had.

Then one day, something happened. That day in the market square changed the whole direction of my life. I was in the middle of securing a purchase, schmoozing some wealthy clients. Then I felt someone tugging at my sleeve. I looked down, and there at my feet was a young man dressed in nothing but rags, pleading with me, on his knees, to give him some money so he could eat. I *did* give him something - a flea in his ear. I told him to get lost. I had important business to finish. But as this beggar slunk off, he looked so pitiful. He was the very opposite of me: so full of myself and head to toe in the best clothes.

Seeing him so miserable made something snap inside me. I was stung to the core. Straight after I had completed that sale, I left the stall and dashed off to find that poor beggar. I gave him everything I had in my pockets, because I was so ashamed of myself. Of course, my friends laughed at me. And my father turned red with rage. Later on, he got even more angry. But that's another story...' - You may already have guessed. This is the early life of St Francis of Assisi, a man determined to both preach and live the gospel of Jesus. St Francis - friend of the poor, friend of creation, friend of enemies, friend of God.

Perhaps this is a story for these days of the cost of living crisis? How will you be a good friend? How will you live the good news of Jesus today?

Hemel Hempstead Child Contact Centre



OPERATION AGRI APPEAL Vital vegetables for Mozambique

Operation Agri is a development charity which supports Christian-led rural and urban development projects in three continents, showing the love of Jesus in action by attacking the basic causes of poverty amongst some of the most disadvantaged people in the world, regardless of their religious, ethnic and cultural backgrounds.

This year's Appeal focuses on a project in Mozambique



Mozambique is a beautiful country with spectacular beaches, but it is very poor: ninth from bottom in the UN Human Development index. 80% work in agriculture, but malnutrition affects many, with 50% below the poverty line.

Rulers and slaves

Mozambique was part of a Shona African empire from the 11th century. Then Arab slave traders spread along the coast, and the country is named after Sultan Mussa al Bik. In the 16th century, Portugal began colonising the country, trading in commodities and slaves. Slave trading was abolished in 1878 after missionary David Livingstone published a report on conditions in Mozambique. Now about 60% of the population are Christian, many Catholic, 20% Muslim and 20% atheist or traditional beliefs.

Independence and civil war

In 1975, after 500 years of Portuguese rule, the country became independent, ruled by the Soviet-backed FRELIMO party. The capital Lourenço Marques was renamed as Maputo. But resistance to socialist policies erupted into years of bitter civil war, with millions killed. Peace came only in 1992, and then the economy began to grow.

Beira and cyclones

Beira is an important port city, both for Mozambique and land-locked Zimbabwe. Set at the mouth of two rivers, Beira often suffers floods. In 2019 Cyclone Idai was one of the worst disasters on record in southern Africa, with huge destruction. Then in 2021 and 2022 cyclones and storms, though less severe, again hit Beira, flooding homes and destroying crops.

Covid restrictions have also hit trade and tourism, with many losing their livelihood.

Vital vegetables for Mozambique

In Mozambique, Operation Agri is partnering with Oasis Global whose ethos is 'a vision for community – a place where everyone is included, making a contribution and reaching their God-given potential'. The Oasis team near Beira is working with women to run community savings and loans groups. This helps them plan their finances, empowers them to work together and gives them the confidence to access healthcare plus education for their children.

Some women earned small amounts of money by travelling to farms to buy produce to trade at the market. They asked how they could grow the crops themselves, so Operation Agri stepped in to help start a Commercial Farming Project. Initially this ran in Manga locality, with regular training for some women's groups, who then passed on what they learnt. Eventually 65 groups of women were involved, with 1500 gaining agricultural advice.

This was so successful that Oasis asked for OA's support to train women in Ngupa, a rural community 40km from Beira, reliant on agriculture and fishing. Oasis assists 40 women's savings groups here, and some churches provide meeting spaces. The Oasis Early Childhood Centre has land to use for crops. 50 women were selected for training in groups of 10, with sessions twice a month. Each one passes on what they learn to other women. They use the Oasis land, and share the harvest. The trainer also does home visits to help them develop their own plots and local fields. At least 550 women overall have now become involved in market gardening. The project is now expanding into fish farming in a protected tank or pond, training men as well as women. Fish is much in demand as a source of protein. A tank may also help, in the dry season, to provide water for crops!

SEASON OF CREATION 1st September – 4th October

Listen to the Voice of Creation

The Season of Creation is the annual Christian celebration to listen and respond together to the cry of Creation: the ecumenical family around the world unites to pray and protect our common home, the Oikos of God.

The Season "Celebration" begins 1 September, the World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation, and ends 4 October, the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi, the patron saint of ecology beloved by many Christian denominations....

The Psalmist declares, "The heavens are telling the glory of God; and the firmament proclaims God's handiwork. Day to day pours forth speech, and night to night declares knowledge their voice is not heard; yet their voice goes out through all the Earth, and their words to the end of the world." (19: 1-4) Creation never ceases to proclaim, but do we listen?

During the Season of Creation, our common prayer and action can help us listen for the voices of those who are silenced. In prayer we lament the individuals, communities, species, and ecosystems who are lost, and those whose livelihoods are threatened by habitat loss and climate change. In prayer we center the cry of the Earth and the cry of the poor.

The burning bush is the Symbol for the Season of Creation 2022.

...Today, the prevalence of unnatural fires are a sign of the devastating effects that climate change has on the most vulnerable of our planet. Creation cries out as forests crackle, animals flee, and people are forced to migrate due to the fires of injustice that we have caused. On the contrary, the fire that called to Moses as he tended the flock on Mt. Horeb did not consume or destroy the bush. This flame of the Spirit revealed God's presence. This holy fire affirmed that God heard the cries of all who suffered, and promised to be with us as we followed in faith to our deliverance from injustice. In this Season of Creation, this symbol of God's Spirit calls us to listen to the voice of creation, and faithfully respond through worship, repentance and action....
