92 DAYS OF LEARNING

I'm well and truly back now from my Sabbatical, which was postponed from 2020. During this time there has been rest, creativity, self health care, family time, learning about challenges faced by those with additional needs, learning Makaton Sign Language and TIDYING MY OFFICE!!!! I could write a whole newsletter on each of these areas. But, with awareness of word count, I will focus on one element of my 5-day silent retreat at St Beuno's in North Wales.

In the grounds of the retreat centre there is a large Labyrinth with gravel path and raised brick boundaries. A Labyrinth is different to a Maze. Mazes are designed to get you lost. A Labyrinth has only one path to the centre and the same path out, and it is often used in prayer and meditation (I believe Carey has a large roll out Labyrinth)

On my first full day of retreat, I decided to attempt to do the Labyrinth with my eyes shut! I was able to tap the bricks with my foot to feel the way. I began to think 'what are the healthy boundaries in my life?'. Soon I wondered what it would be like to walk down the centre without relying on the boundaries? I felt all adrift. This is like when we try to do things in our own strength.

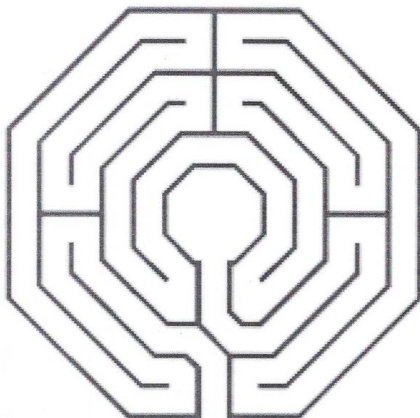
As I walked along, still with eyes shut, I held my hands out in prayer in front of me with palm up. I was amazed that the sun must have been shining on my hands, because I could feel the brightness reflected back on my face. I know prayer is powerful, but this felt like a physical reminder.

There were so many other revelations with my eyes shut. I completed it in 75 minutes! The next day I revisited the Labyrinth with my eyes open and saw where the gravel was scuffed up or the bricks out of place. I tried to fix it all, but I couldn't. Even this was a lesson for me. Half-way through the Labyrinth the sun was shining and I wanted to take a selfie photo with the path behind me. I turned around to get the best shot. I got a lovely photo, but I nearly forgot which direction I was going! Its so easy to get distracted and lost!

Every time I went back, I had to discipline myself that when I'd reached the centre, I wouldn't then rush back, because the return journey is just as important as the way in, because you often find yourself changed on the way back, and if you hurry, you might miss it.

If you ever get chance to do a Labyrinth, even using your own finger on a printed 'Finger Labyrinth', go for it and see where God will guide you.

Tribute to Ray Clarke

We are sad to record the death of Ray Clarke on 13th October, at the age of 92(?). He met Win when working at the GPO in London and they were married in 1953. Two of their sons were born in Islington and two in Hemel Hempstead, after they moved here in 1958. At the time of his retirement he held a senior post in the Post Office. He and Win took up ballroom

dancing in the mid-1970's and won many awards. Holidays, both in this country and abroad, were a highlight of their lives for many years.

Ray and Win started attending Carey Baptist Church in the early 80's and were received into membership in July 1991. Ray contributed much to the life of Carey over the years, including by leading the Men's Fellowship and helping with the fabric work. He and Win also helped with stewarding right up to the start of the pandemic. He was a driver for the Heather Club, with Mark as escort, for a number of years. Comments from friends at Carey have included: 'He was a warm, friendly person', 'a real gentleman', 'always interested in how you were', 'he and Win were kind people – they always had a smile and were very welcoming at the door – very helpful'.

Ray's committal service will be at 12.20pm on Tuesday 8th November at Garston, followed by a Thanksgiving Service at Carey at 1.30pm.

Once again, the Sunday worship service will be livestreamed so that those unable to come to Telford will be able to join in our worship and hear from this year's speaker.

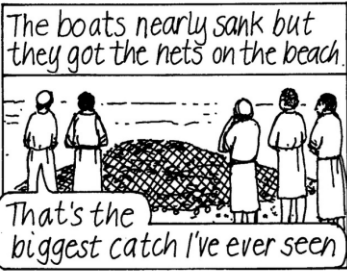
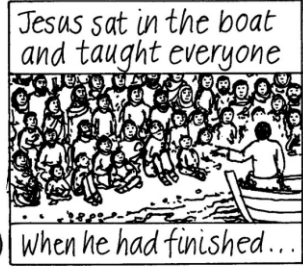
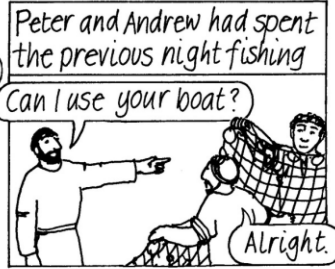

CELEBRATING THE LIFE OF BROTHER ANDREW (1928-2022)

Brother Andrew, the founder of Open Doors, died on 27th September, aged 94.

Famous around the world as 'God's smuggler', he began his ministry in 1957 by smuggling Bibles across the Iron Curtain in a blue Volkswagen Beetle. That trip was the beginning of Open Doors which, more than 65 years later, is now supporting persecuted Christians around the world.

The remarkable story of his Bible 'smuggling' was told in his best-selling autobiography *God's Smuggler*.

After the fall of the Iron Curtain, Brother Andrew turned his attention to the Islamic World, saying that the rapid spread of Islam posed the greatest challenge yet to the Christian church worldwide. He travelled to the Middle East and South Asia and had private meetings with leaders of several Islamic fundamentalist groups. However, Brother Andrew preached against retaliation – repeatedly declaring 'I sincerely love all Muslims' as a counter to the rising Islamophobia in the west.

Queen Beatrix of the Netherlands knighted Brother Andrew in 1993. In 1997, he received the World Evangelical Alliance's Religious Liberty Award, recognising his lifetime of service to suffering Christians.

But Open Doors UK reveals that "perhaps the recognition that pleased him most was the copies of KGB reports, which he obtained after the fall of the Iron Curtain. There were more than 150 pages about him, detailing his work in the Soviet Union and Eastern Europe. Despite this, they were still unable to stop his work."

WILL AID

Remember, remember it's Will Aid this November

Will Aid, www.willaid.org.uk, the UK's most enduring and successful charity Will-making scheme, runs again this month, throughout November. If you haven't yet written your Will, now is the time to think about it!

This is how the system works: Will Aid solicitors all over the UK agree to write basic Wills during November, without charging their usual fee. Instead, these solicitors raise as much money as possible for the Will Aid charities, by asking Will-makers for a donation, which reflects the time and expertise they have devoted to writing the Will. The suggested donation is £100 for a single Will, £180 for a pair of basic 'mirror Wills'.

Will Aid is effective. Not only does it raise substantial money for charity, but also motivates people to get on and make their Will – something that many people have been meaning to get around to for years.

'BRAVER' – A NOVEL

'My hope is that people will read it and think about church differently'

Interview with freelance writer, teacher and Baptist church member Deborah Jenkins about her novel *Braver*, and her long-held dream of writing a book about people with faith – *Baptist Times* 11/10/22

What's the basic premise of your book?

Braver is about an unlikely friendship between three people: Hazel, a teaching assistant with anxiety; Harry, a vulnerable teenage boy and Virginia, a church minister with a troubled past. Finding friendship and a sense of belonging with people from the local church, each begins to find the courage to face their 'demons'. But when an accusation is made, it

threatens to destroy everything they've worked for.

Why did you write it?

Years ago, I decided I'd love to write a novel for the mainstream market that might help people think about God and church in a positive way. This would be through some of the characters, not serene, joy-filled ones, but ordinary, flawed people trying to live a faith-filled life in a messy world with varying degrees of success. But I was advised that it would be almost impossible to do this as publishers don't think people want to read about the positives associated with faith....

Then, in 2020, we went into lockdown and, as an extremely vulnerable adult, I was at home for months. I decided I would give the novel another go. I stumbled across some research to show that being part of a church can lengthen life, reduce depression and promote positive mental health. I therefore planned to set the story in a local community where some characters meet people from their local church, finding friendship and a sense of belonging which has a positive impact on their lives.

You tackle some serious issues such as mental health, loss, safeguarding, loneliness and bullying. What was the thinking behind that?

These are sadly all features of modern life and for readers to relate to a book, it must be realistic. Mental health problems, a sense of loss, loneliness and bullying are rife in society, perhaps even more so since the pandemic.

Safeguarding is an unfortunate necessity in all walks of life because of the horrifying stories of abuse that we often hear about. If we don't absolutely stick to safeguarding procedures, even when we're sure people's intentions are good, we put everyone at risk.

Somehow, writing about these things legitimises our experiences and helps us to feel less alone. The reality is we're all in this together, but we can help each other.

By contrast, this is a heartwarming story about the power of community. Why was it important for you to set this in the context of a church?

It was very important. I had read several novels about the power of

community to change lives, among a group of swimmers for example, or dog walkers or customers at a café. I loved the hope and positivity these stories offered, and it occurred to me that churches can be wonderful places to find such things. It also fitted perfectly with my long-held dream of writing a book about people with faith. Like a jigsaw easing into place, it felt like *Braver* was asking to be written, although I had no idea if anyone would publish it.

This is published by a mainstream publisher, as opposed to a Christian one. Was this deliberate?

It was. As mentioned above, I wanted the book to be accessible to everyone, perhaps helping to change some of the negative images about church often presented in the media. Christian publishers do an excellent job with books aimed at the Christian market and although some get their publications into mainstream bookshops, it tends to be the exception. After many rejections, I had an offer from a Christian publisher I greatly respect but when Fairlight Books also made an offer, I decided to go with them. They've been a joy to work with.

You've mentioned that some pre-publication reviews have praised the way in which Christianity has been presented 'in a positive light without being preachy'. What was your response to this? Why?

I was delighted! Interestingly, the definition of 'preachy' is 'having or showing a tendency to give moral advice in a tedious or self-righteous way.' Preachy fiction, whatever it's about, tends to annoy not convince. But well-told stories with believable characters and relatable themes have the power to connect with people in ways that moralistic messages never will. Jesus knew this as did others, like C S Lewis and Tolkien. I hope *Braver* has these things but it's probably not my place to say!

What are your hopes for *Braver*? Do you have a message to Baptist church members about it?

My hope is that people will read it and think about church differently. If it occurs to one person after reading *Braver*, to go to their local church for friendship and support it will have been worthwhile writing it. Of course, some churches may not be as welcoming and inclusive as the one in my book, but I believe this is how church ought to be. I suppose my message

to the Baptist family would be to please consider buying and reading Braver. And if you like it, recommend it to someone you know outside the church.....

'Braver ' is available from all good bookshops and online.
